NOVEMBER 2, 2023

At the September 7, 2023, the board heard from Marc Schut. The Recovery Café Network (RCN) is comprised of individual Recovery Cafés committed to serving people who have experienced trauma and the results of trauma including homelessness, substance use disorder, addiction, and other mental health challenges using the Recovery Café model.

The Recovery Cafe model is referred to by the larger behavioral health community as a Recovery Oriented System of Care (ROSC). A ROSC meets people where they are on the recovery continuum, engages them in a lifetime of managing their health, focuses holistically on a person's needs, and empowers them to build a life that realizes their full potential. This person-centered system of care supports individuals as they establish a healthy life and recognizes that we all need a meaningful sense of membership and belonging in community.

Recovery Café provides support, resources, and a community of care along the entire continuum of a person's need for recovery support. Recovery Cafe's teach skills to manage mental and physical health, maintain sobriety, build community, and help individuals reclaim their lives and identities.

NOVEMBER 16, 2023

On September 21, 2023, the board discussed potential legislative priority recommendations. There was consensus around supporting ways to better support behavioral health and co-response and funding.

HUMAN SERVICES AWARDS

In November the City of Monroe made a request for proposal for \$300,000.00 in general funds to implement the desired outcomes of providing housing with wrap around services. The board is in the process of reviewing the applications that the City received and making a recommendation for an award of funding.

NOVEMBER 21, 2023

We were so pleased to be presented with a ceremonial check from U.S. Congresswoman Suzan DelBene (Washington 1st District) that symbolizes the \$481,000 federal appropriation she sponsored for the regional Mobile Mental Health program.

The Mobile Mental Health program, administered by the Volunteers of America-Western Washington (VOAWW), provides emergency mental health resources, joining with police, fire, and emergency medical personnel when responding to people experiencing mental health crisis. This co-response model enables mental health professionals to meet people where they are and assist them in seeking out resources to support their recovery and stability. In addition to federal funding, the program is supported by the cities of Monroe and Sultan and Snohomish County. Currently, Monroe and Sultan are served by one mental health professional.




The new Mobile Mental Health program was launched in June of 2023. Mental Health Professional, Jessi Beyer, is stationed Wednesday/Thursday in Sultan and Friday/Saturday in Monroe. Jessi is able to be dispatched as a resource to First Responders between 2:00pm-10:00pm those days.

A new program goal is to expand services to cover seven days a week. This program is currently the only one of its kind in Snohomish County.

This is Volunteers of America's fourth season running the East County Cold Weather Shelters, This year the Shelter Staff was finally able to connect with a guest that has been utilizing the Cold Weather Shelter every year.

This gentleman is young but has lived in chronic homelessness for nearly a decade.

He's never connected to a navigator before.

This season he took the step. VOA was able to get him a phone so he could reconnect with his family and start the steps to finding stability in his life.

NOVEMBER

In November the Monroe Cold Weather Shelter was open for 13 nights. This provided a total of 108 bed nights to 48 unduplicated individuals.

The Snohomish Cold Weather Shelter served 42 unduplicated individuals and provided 146 bed nights during this same time.
